

## SUMMARY OF GRANT APPLICATIONS 2017

Organisation	Approved 2017	Power	Summary of Purpose of Grant
1. Coultish Centre Pensioner's Club	£750	LGA 1972 S137	To provide funding to take members of the club out and about throughout the year. Lots of members are on their own and have no family to take them out and about.
2. Selby & District Rail Users Group	£600	LG & Rating Act 1997 S30	To provide funding for room hire at the Community Centre and continuing admin costs, attending meetings and Campaigns to defend and improve rail services on behalf of the Town's residents.
3. Relate	£2,500	LGA 1972 S142	The funding is to provide relationship counselling for people in need in Selby. The funding helps to support couples, individuals and families. Each appointment costs over £50 (professional counselling fees and admin costs). The grant funding would be used to subsidise appointments for people from Selby on low income and are unable to contribute towards their counselling appointments. The funding will also be used to support the free service for children and young people.
4. Selby Camera Club	£500	LG (Misc Prov) Act 1976 S19	Display stands for exhibitions to promote the club and show pictures taken by members of the club. The club holds its annual exhibition in Selby Abbey. The club helps promote, educate and encourage amateur photographers of all ages and backgrounds from Selby and surrounding areas.
5. Selby Citizens Advice Bureau	£12,000	LGA 1972 S142	A contribution towards the general annual running costs of the Selby town centre office in order to maintain the service they offer and to enable them to extend the opening times as demand for the service increases. In particular they are seeking support for the expenses of the volunteers who travel to provide services.
6. Selby Abbey	£2,400	LGA 1972 S214	To pay for the clock winding and flood lighting at the Abbey.
7. Civic Society	£650	LGA 1972 S137	To cover the administrative costs and room hire fees for the Community Centre for 12 monthly meetings and Portholme Church for 5 public meetings. Also to cover the cost of printing and consumables used by the Society to produce publicity leaflets and documents for member and the Selby public.
8. Selby Striders	£930	LG (Misc Prov) Act 1976 S19	To provide funding to cover the cost of training Assistant Coaches and a Head Coach to ensure the Junior Club continues in the future. Current only 1 coach plus parents help at the Junior Club with 22 Juniors. The coach is due to retire in the next 18 months. The Junior Club started in 2007. The Striders have run the Fun Run every year and this year the flyer will have the Town Council's logo attached.

9. Carers Count Selby District	£600	LGA 1972 S142	The funding is to promote Carers Week (12-18 June 2017) with an event during the week in the Town Hall and raise awareness of carers that live not only in Selby District but Nationally. During this period they find hidden carers and help alleviate some of the issues that carers face such as isolation, loneliness and financial hardship. There will be drop in sessions, held at the Community Centre, where carers and the general community can contact various agencies.
10. Selby District Vision	£1,081	LGA 1972 S145	The funding would be used to provide service users with an Audio-Described Theatre Performance experience; an Audio Described Touch-Tour of the Emmerdale Studios; A learning trip to Stockbridge; A Christmas Open Day at the Town Hall which is an event for clients, volunteers and supports and Support to hold the AGM.
11. Age UK Selby District	NIL	LGA 1972 S142	Age UK has received funding from NYCC as a bolt on to their “connecting you” service, where they are in a position to help people aged 50 plus with digital inclusion. They run computer classes with a member of staff and a volunteer computer lecturer, to deliver a basic understanding of computers, tablets, phones and apps. They also give individual tuition in someone’s home. The funding will be used to help extend this service and support adult learning services in Selby. They have a variety of different devices and skill set to support people at all levels and understanding in this ever changing world of technology.
12. Flaxley Road TARA	NIL	LGA 1972 S137	The TARA have started a Remembrance Garden at the Coultish Centre, phase 1 has put in paving and seating. In phase 2 they will be buying plants for the garden. The funding will pay for shrubs and small plants to be planted in the garden. They have also applied to Tesco Bag Scheme to pay for Planters.
13. Selby District Food Bank	£3,500	LGA 1972 S137	The funding will cover the premises annual running costs and training of Volunteers and any contribution towards the £4,800 would be greatly appreciated. The Food Bank has new rented premises at 30 New Lane Selby. It is run by 30 volunteers with no paid employees. They have provided 1235 people so far this year (1 April 2016 – 21 March 2017) having received vouchers from 587 clients comprising of individuals and families. There were 481 clients the previous year.

14. Selby Community Furniture Store	£1,000	LG & Public Involvement Act 2007 S77	The grant funding would be to support the costs of publicising the store which would help people know the store exists, help more people with limited means acquire household goods at low costs and create decent home, remind people with goods they no longer need that they provide a simple and efficient service to make sure those goods find a new home and are not just thrown away, let people know about their work experience training project and bring more people into the store. They have a facebook page but need to advertise regularly via newspapers and local link magazines. They would also like to advertise this year on Minster FM.
15. Selby District DIAL	£8,000 (in two payments of £4,000)	LGA 1972 S142	The funding is requested as a contribution towards the core (general) running costs of the organisation, particularly to support the salary costs of the Specialist Disability Welfare Rights Advisor and Helpline Advisor who provide welfare benefits advice, full benefits checks and assistance to complete welfare benefit applications. This service would be provided at the DIAL office in Selby and via home visits to reach disabled people, their carers and family members of all ages who are unable to visit their offices.
16. Sing Yourself Happy	£1,000	LGA 2000 S2 amended by the Local Gov & Public Involvement in Health Act 2007 S77	The group meets weekly for a singalong and includes people with Dementia, Alzheimers, Parkinsons etc who all benefit from these get-togethers and really do sing themselves happy accompanied by a family member or carer. We regularly run sessions with a "theme" and the recent one attended by the Deputy Mayor was loosely based around St Patricks Day. We have received some funds in the past to pay for social outings and that is what this funding would be used for. The funding would enable us to pay for a couple of trips during the summer months.
17. Music Connections Yorkshire CIC	NIL	LGA 1972 S137	Music Connections Yorkshire will bring the first of an annual "Young Musician Competition" to Selby in June 2017. In the first year they will roll it out to primary schools in Selby town to establish the event. The competition will be split into different categories and ages and will finish with a concert for the category winners to compete for the overall winners' trophy. There will be two independent professional musicians who will adjudicate and the final concert will be held in Selby Abbey. Participation and enjoyment are the primary objectives for this event and the opportunity for pupils to receive encouragement and feedback from a professional musician. The funding from STC would be used to cover the following costs: Planning, organising and managing the event; marketing and admin costs; DBS checked staff to run the competition over 2 days, professional adjudicator fees; hire of Selby Abbey; evaluation and feedback assessment.

18. Phazers Out of School Club, Brayton Community Centre	NIL	LG (Misc Prov) Act 1976 S19	To improve the outside yard area in response to a recent OFSTED report. These improvements would help us to improve our current Good rating to Outstanding. There is an existing fence and gate that needs repairing to make the area safe and we also hope to add extra provision including large wall mounted chalkboard that will provide our children the opportunity to express their creative ideas. They would like to add thermal graphics designed by club users. They hope this will benefit our users and encourage them to develop skills in many areas. They have 123 members and 70 come from Selby. The club is a not-for-profit club.
19. Barlby Raiders JFC	NIL	LG (Misc Prov) Act 1976 S19	The Barlby Raiders would like to ask for funding to enhance the playing assets of the club, through the provision of additional fixed goals for the lower age group pitches. Whereas the club have managed to achieve the erection of permanent goals for the older age groups the younger teams are still heavily reliant on pop up goals which are prone to wear and tear at a much faster rate than their permanent counterparts. There are 135 members and 25 from Selby.
20. Selby Globe Community Cinema	£1,000	LGA 2000 S2 amended by the Local Gov & Public Involvement in Health Act 2007 S77	To promote the good work of the volunteers to groups and local people across the town, to increase numbers of people attending the cinema project and fulfil their aim of being sustainable. The group have two local businesses who would allow a 5ft x 3ft sign subject to planning permission to promote the Community cinema, £285. Seek an outside display case to promote films shows £395, an outdoor banner and frame for events and which could be taken to local halls and schools £210. To connect the cinema project with the Town Hall events in the Town Hall programme with funding for advertisements £750, Globe flyers and to produce promotional calendars of Selby cinemas past and present, £390. In addition hold three free events for local groups to promote the work and establish links specifically for the silver screen and Monday night cinema projects. They have 24 volunteers and 14 live in Selby.
21. Edge Community's DNA (part of St James Church, Selby)	£1,000	Local Government (Misc Provisions) Act 1976 S19	The funding will go towards Community Youth Work, developing small groups (filmmaking group, self-harm support group, Subbuteo football group, vehicle restoration group) plus Bus outreach and Camping Holidays.

22. IDAS Selby	£2,160	LGA 1972 S137	To provide a Move on Group for people who have experienced sexual violence and is intended to increase self-esteem and confidence. The funding will pay for 2 Safe Lives Accredited Independent Sexual Violence Advisors to further develop, plan and facilitate a six week long group, twice a year; May-June and Sept-Oct 2017. The planning and further development will take 2 hours per week and the sessions will run for 3 hours once each week. Approx. 72 hours in all including travel time. To help reduce the cost the group sessions would be held at the IDAS office in Selby. The funding will also pay for all associated stationery, handouts, worksheets etc. The group would be available to people who have experienced sexual violence that live in Selby Town.
23. Age UK Selby District	£2,000	LGA 1972 S137	To provide funding for carpets and light fittings to a new premises in Micklegate, Selby.
24. The Refugee Council	£3,000	LGA 1972 S137 or Local Gov and Rating Act S29 (2) 27	To provide transport for the Syrian Refugees and their families and befrienders in Selby to visit North Yorkshire and the funds would be used to pay for coach hire with a small contribution towards lunch.
25. Selby Children's University / Selby Community Primary School	£4,718	LGA 1972 S137	To further publicise the Children's University to local schools. The University aims to promote social mobility by providing high quality out of school hours activities to children aged 7 to 14 and engage the wider communities as learning partners. It enables young people to make the most of their abilities and interests regardless of the background into which they were born.
